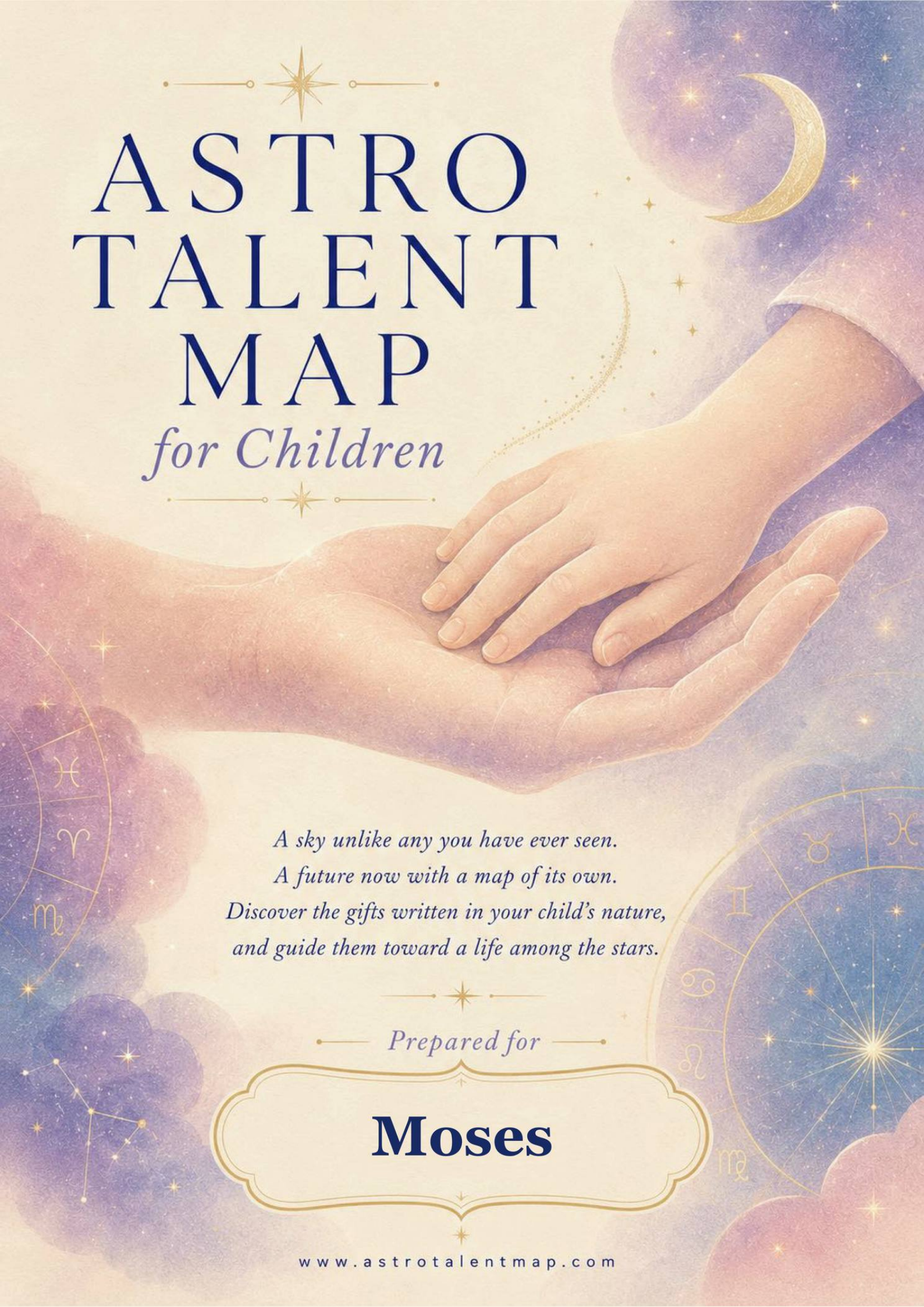

II. UNDERSTANDING THE MAP



The birth chart used in this report is based on precise astronomical calculation: the date, time and place of birth are used to calculate the positions of the Sun, Moon and planets against the celestial sphere at the moment of birth. 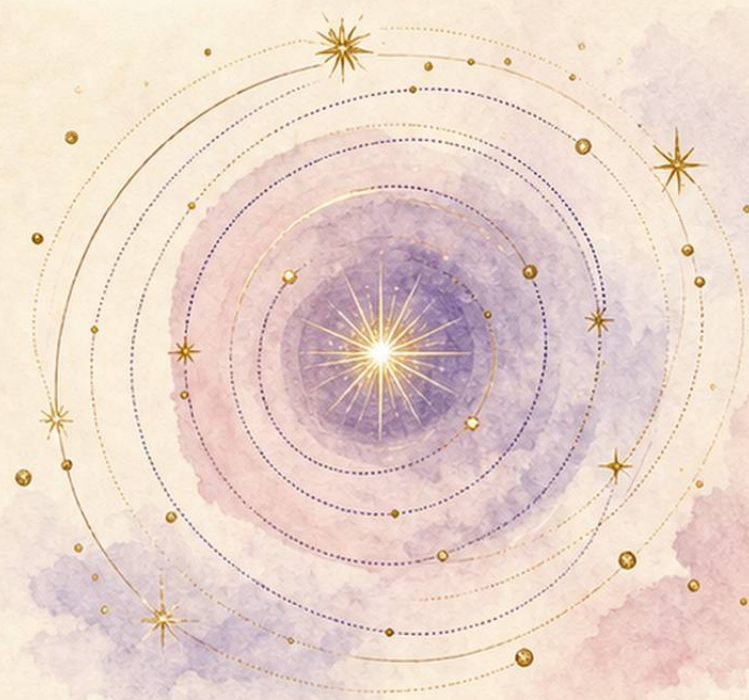


2. Personality Foundation

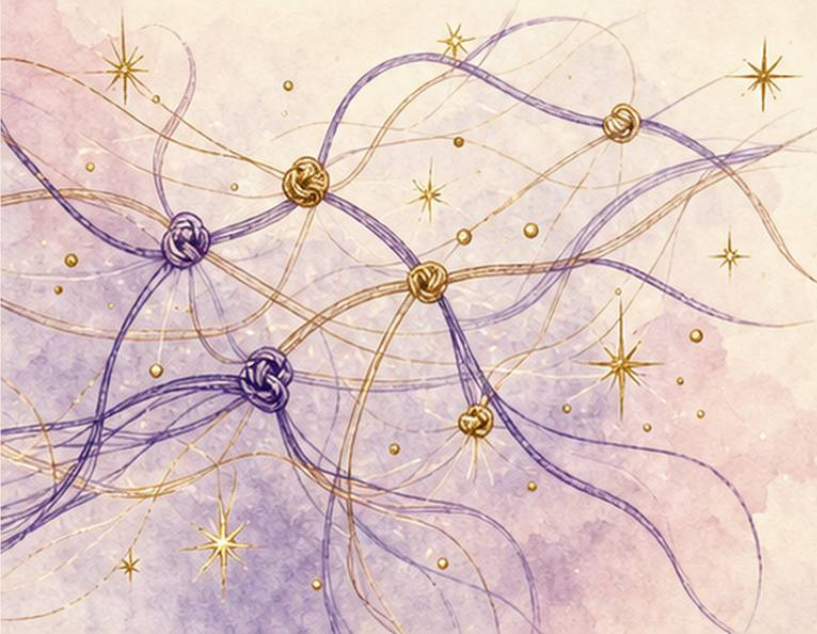

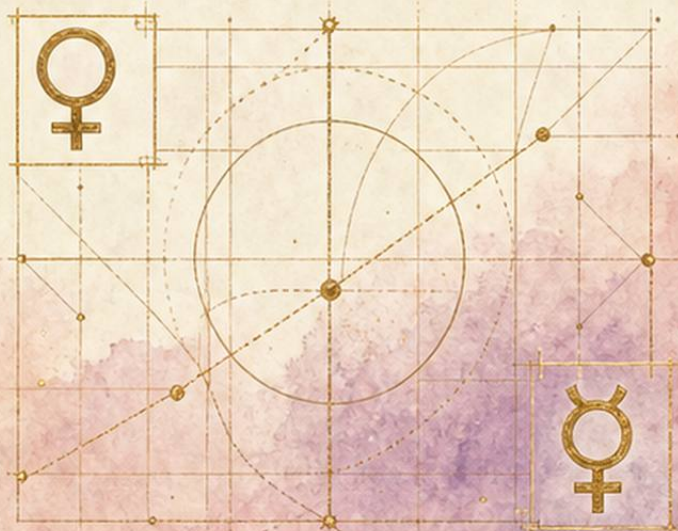
Saturn's very close sextile to Neptune links imagination with form: a vision can become a plan, a mood can become music, and a dream can become a model.

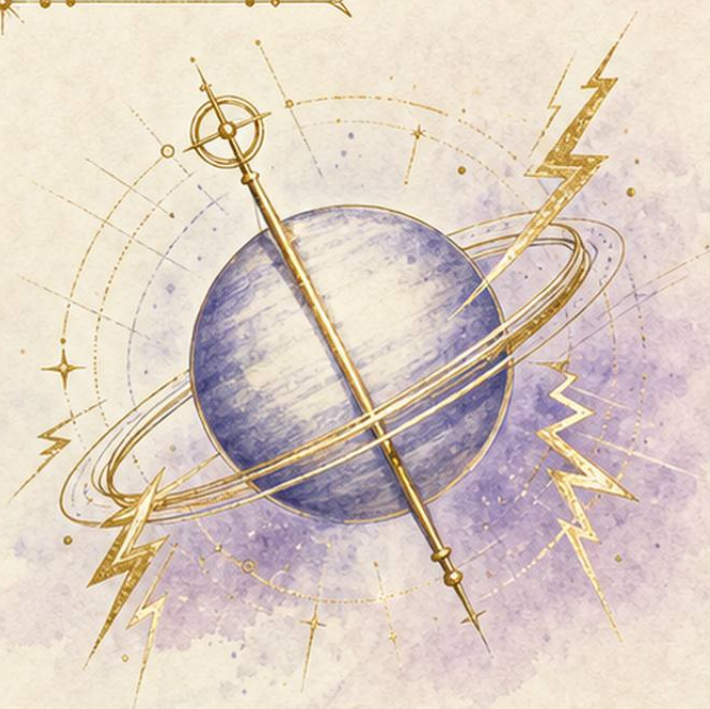

Speed before regulation

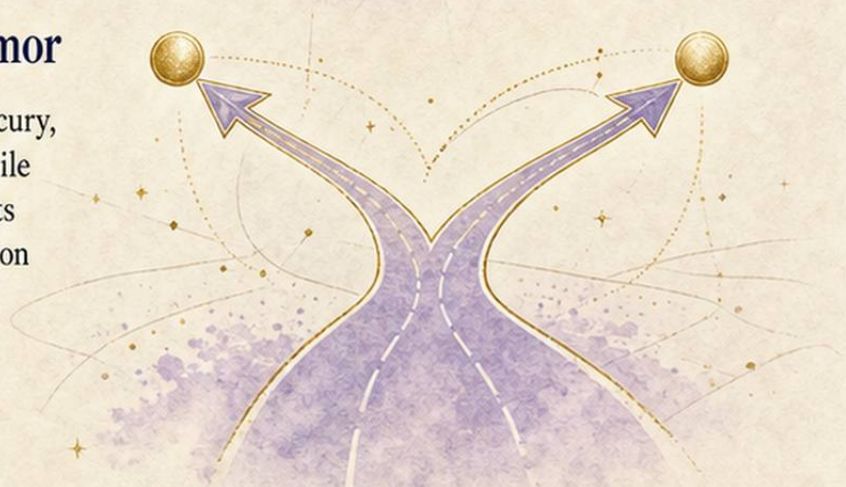

Sun $4^{\circ}29'$ Mercury



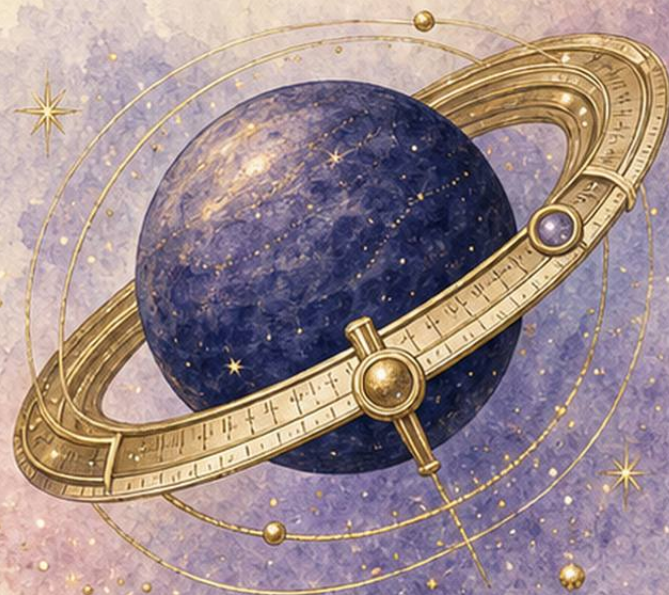
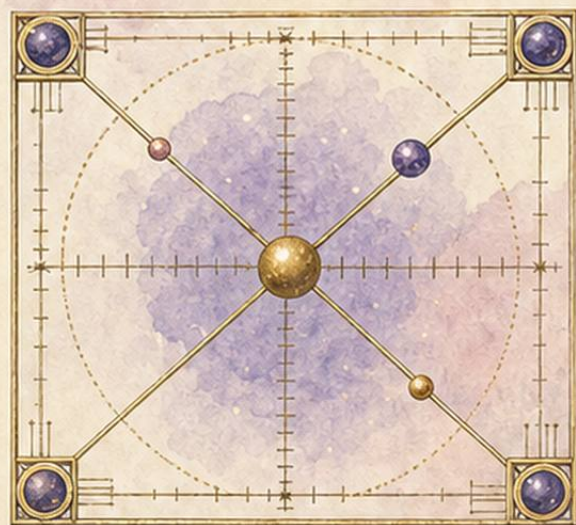
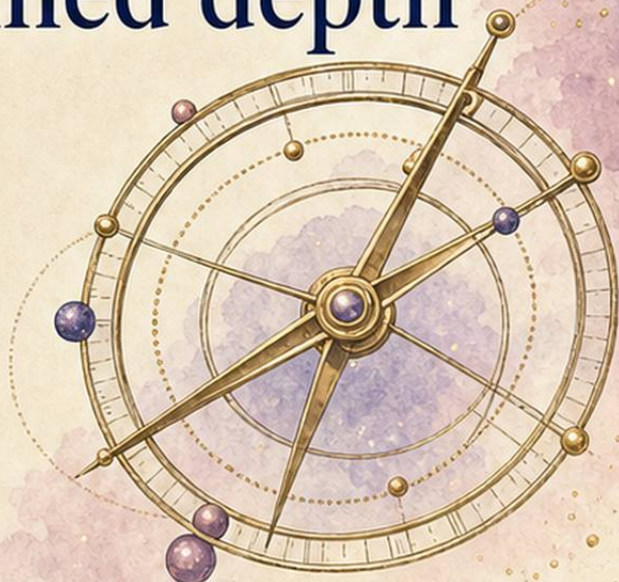
Perspective, action, and disciplined depth

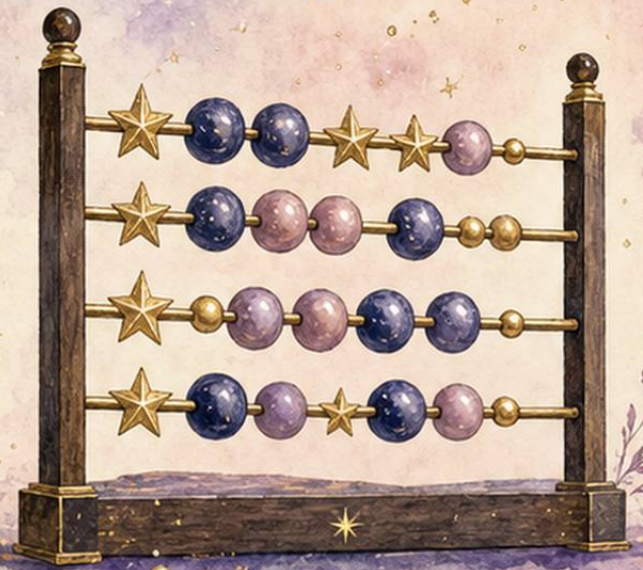
Science and STEM

12. The Essential Message for Parents



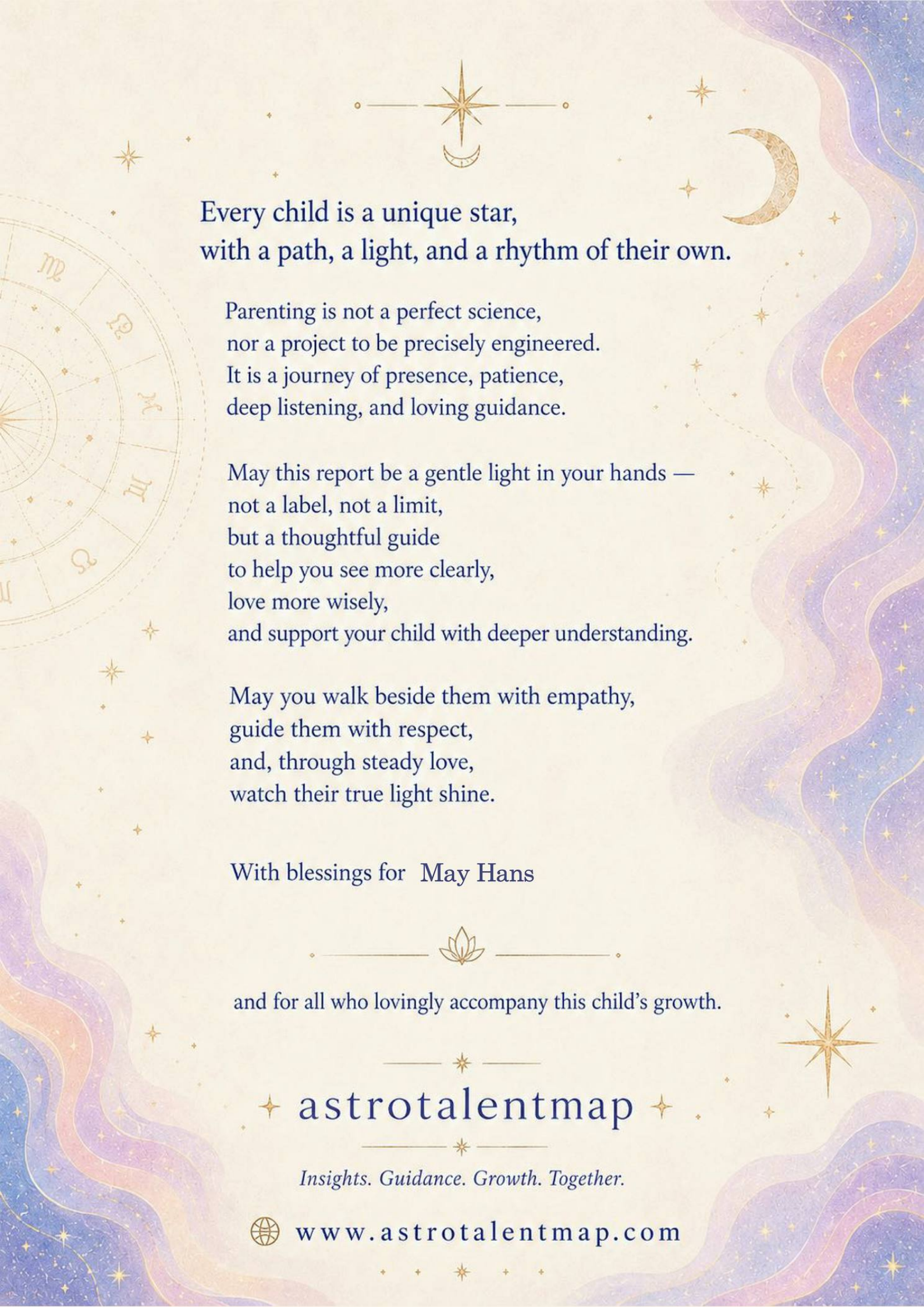
